UGANDA'S FAMILY PLANNING VISION FOR 2030:

A population empowered to enjoy their SRH rights for improved quality of life and enhanced productivity.

1. Increase equitable access and voluntary use of modern contraceptive methods



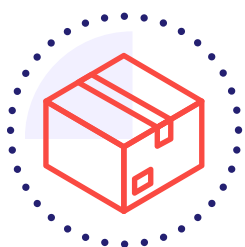
Evidence-based information will be used to inform and monitor targeted interventions in humanitarian, hard-to-reach and urban poor populations. Uganda's implementation of high impact family planning practices will be scaled up.

2. Increase funding for adolescent sexual and reproductive health programmes



A re-commitment to annually allocate at least 10% of maternal and child health resources to adolescent responsive health services by July 2025. To ensure strategic resource allocation, release, and expenditure, the government will build capacity for youth-led involvement and conduct annual tracking of different budget streams.

3. Ensure contraceptive commodity security



Through annual forecasting, annual budgeting, and quantification on family planning commodities, the Ugandan government will equally prioritize procurement, warehousing, and distribution.

4. Strengthen the policy and enabling environment for family planning



Uganda's implementation of advocacy approaches for policy change and operationalization of the National FP Costed Implementation Plan (CIP) II will galvanize stakeholders, spur domestic resource investments, and catalyze the scale-up of interventions.

5. Strengthen family planning data use at all levels



Service delivery points in both the public and private sectors will use Demographic Health Information Survey 2/Health Management Information System data for decision making and improved service provision. Each health sub-district will be able to allocate resources according to the indicated needs of community health workers and village teams.

6. Address family planning myths and misconceptions through evidence-based Social & Behavior Change Strategies



Improving the quality of family planning counselling among Uganda's service delivery points, community health workers and peer-led education initiatives. Mass media and leaders at all levels will also be engaged.

Approach to Accountability

Uganda's FP2030 commitment will also be addressed in their national FP plan's own accountability structures.

The Ugandan government will regularly update FP2030, subnational stakeholders, and other partners on nation-wide progress. Large, bi-annual validation meetings will provide the platform for review and devising strategies to accelerate the achievement of particularly problematic elements.



UGANDA'S ADOPTION OF THE MOTION TRACKER FRAMEWORK

- 1 Mutual, bottom-up, and social accountability mechanisms:** common understanding of each partner's specific responsibilities so that there is a clear delegation of duties.
- 2 Meaningful participation of traditionally underserved and overlooked groups:** development of new, local Partner Matrices will help ensure involvement from relevant actors.
- 3 Ensuring visibility and transparency:** regular partner engagements, online updates, and media outreach.
- 4 Neutral party to review progress and take remedial action if rights are violated:** this party will produce a commitment progress report every 6 months.
