ABOUT FP2030

FP2030 is the only global partnership centered solely on family planning. This singular focus allows us to bring together the widest possible range of partners across disciplines and sectors while situating family planning at the crossroads of the global health, development, and gender equality agendas. The partnership has guiding principles that reflect our core values and themes:


- Country-led global partnerships, with shared learning and mutual accountability for commitments and results.
- Voluntary, person-centered, rights-based approaches to family planning, with equity at the core.
- A commitment to gender equality, with support for empowering women and girls and engaging men, boys, and communities.
- Intentional and equitable partnerships with adolescents, youths, and marginalized populations to meet their needs, informed by accurate and disaggregated data collection and use.

To support our core values, FP2030 recently launched its new Advocacy and Accountability Framework (AAF), which outlines the role of advocacy and accountability in the FP2030 partnership. The Framework includes broad advocacy priorities and a global accountability framework for tracking the progress of FP2030 commitments. The global accountability framework is rooted in mutual accountability and consists of four parallel cycles (country commitment tracking, country data tracking, donor contribution tracking, and non-government actor tracking) that feed into global progress tracking. The Framework is designed to ensure commitments are made and implemented in a culture of transparency, shared knowledge and evidence, and collective responsibility.

COUNTRY COMMITMENT TRACKING:

FP2030 is piloting the country commitment tracking approach included in the AAF in three countries to support transparent and collaborative accountability. The country commitment tracking cycle is centered on the government's responsibility to its citizens and relies on collaboration between the government and civil society. The government in each commitment-making country collaborates with local civil society organizations (CSOs) and other stakeholders to track and validate progress on the government's FP2030 commitments, using mechanisms such as the Motion Tracker or Community Score Card. Together the government and CSOs prepare an annual Country Report summarizing their progress, which is shared at the country level first and then with FP2030 for publication in the annual report and on the FP2030 website.





THE OPPORTUNITY:

FP2030 is seeking to partner with three civil society organizations in Ethiopia, the Gambia, Ghana, Liberia, Malawi, Nigeria, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, and Zambia to pilot the country commitment tracking approach. The next phase will include Francophone and Asian countries. Selected partners are expected to work with government representatives and the FP community in their country to monitor, validate, report progress, and act on their country's FP2030 commitment and should be prepared to share their experiences and results.

GRANT DETAILS:

Civil society and nonprofit organizations in Ethiopia, the Gambia, Ghana, Liberia, Malawi, Nigeria, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, and Zambia will be considered for funding. Nonprofit organizations include local and international civil society, non-governmental, or youth-led organizations. Each grant will be for a maximum of \$80,000 USD and be awarded in July 2023 for a grant period of 18 months. To be considered, a complete application must be **submitted to AAgrants@fp2030.org by May 12, 2023.**

ELIGIBILITY AND FUNDING CRITERIA

- A legally registered civil society or nonprofit organization operating in Ethiopia, the Gambia, Ghana, Liberia, Malawi, Nigeria, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, or Zambia.
- Familiarity with the FP2030 partnership and your country's FP2030 commitment.
- Demonstrated organizational commitment to improving access to FP.
- Current or past work relevant to advocacy, accountability, and/or family planning.
- Dedicated bank account in the organization's name, which can receive funds in USD.
- Demonstrated strong financial oversight and internal controls.

EXPECTATIONS OF FUND RECIPIENTS

- Contribute to working in collaboration with CSOs and the government to monitor, review, and report on commitment progress.
- Document progress- achievements, setbacks, unexpected outcomes, and any change in project direction.
- Share project results with FP2030, other stakeholders, and relevant organizations to your project.
- Maintain regular email and virtual communications with FP2030.
- Provide midterm and final financial and narrative reports.
